## Other Fun Activities For Students

- Using plastic letters (or letters written on index cards) have students practice spelling words. (ie "at", "cat", "sat", "bat", "rat" or "it", "mit", "fit"...)
- Have your child write his/her name or words in sand, shaving cream, salt, pudding....(works well on a cookie sheet)
- Using play dough make shapes, letters, numbers, words
- Count items in your house- light switches, doors, windows....
- Have your child pick an item and describe it to you until you can guess it (color, shape, size, purpose...)
- Practice making their own word problems using objects they have- ie. I have 4 blue cars and 3 green cars, how many do I have total? (Can they write the numbers to go along with it?)
- Have your child keep a journal of their favorite things they did this summer (They can draw a picture, tell you what to write, or try to write it on their own.)
- Write a letter to someone- a teacher, friend, relative
- Cut pictures out of a magazine that begin with a specific letter of the alphabet.
- Make something out of recycled materials. (Give them the materials and let them play!)
- Take a walk and draw things that you see (trees, bugs, flowers, birds...)
- Read- let your child tell you a story using the pictures they see in the book. (It's normal for them not to know the words on the page)
- Write a few sentences about an event that happened and draw a picture to go along with it.
